It certainly has performed its objective well as all types of wild life have been observed: beaver, geese, ducks, rabbits, muskrats, and Blue Herron, to name a few. Your board would welcome pictures of any of these creatures to proudly display at any of our get-togethers.

Speaking of creatures, our scaled friends of the water variety (fish) should have grown substantially over the winter. This should be our best summer ever for fishing. It also means we will have some outsiders on our lake. Remember, all of our boats should have the lot numbers displayed. Do not hesitate to ask someone you do not know who is fishing if he lives on the lake. Our community has worked hard to make good fishing possible, and we deserve the fruits of our labor. We would welcome reports on how the fishing is progressing.

Do not forget to display your Indian Lake/Indian Head logo in the back window of your vehicles. This will help security patrol our community.

Hopefully, I will see you all at the beach clean-up.
