PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow Residents of Indian Lake,

The September meeting of the Indian Lake Board of Directors was held at the home of Mrs. French on Tuesday, September 13, 1988. Committee reports were submitted as follows:

North Beach

The North Beach will close for the season on November 1, 1988.

After that date, lake residents may use the sand area at the North Beach for winter storage of boats. The beach port-o-lets will be removed during September. The port-o-let service has been excellent this year.

South Beach

On two recent weekends the South Beach area was used by non-residents. Upon investigation, J.D. Bush learned that these uninvited guests had been given a key to the South Beach gate by a former resident who no longer lives at Indian Lake. J.D. secured the key for the Association, and succeeded in getting the trespassers to leave. Keeping the Association property private is an important and difficult job. I'd like to thank J.D., on behalf of us all.

Dr. Phil Bly has removed five dead trees at the South Beach area.

Lake Conservation

A partial payment has been made by Mr. Dennis Franklin toward the repare of damage done to the East End gate. Complete payment is being pursued.

After removing fifty-one more carp from the lake, Phil Bly has retired the gill net for this season.

Dam

Superior Fence Company has constructed a fence at the dam site. Phil Bly has secured the services of Mr. Lowell McVey, who will install a mercury light with a light sensor at the dam. Fred Lee will contact I.P.L. to have the electrical current for this light hooked up.

Property Maintenance

Red Harris has replaced the chains on the swings at the park. Red reports that the mowing of Indian Lake property is being done on schedule. Phil Bly and Fred Lee are sealing/caulking the cracks in the tennis court surface. Fred is again attempting to get the Lawrence Street Department to fill some low spots along our streets with crushed stone.

The Board invites all residents to attend the October meeting.
