Traffic safety starts at home

The Smoke Signal received the following letter from a concerned resident.

The stop sign on the north side of the Indian Lake Community at the intersection of Indian Lake Road and Indian Lake Blvd. North has been a serious problem for years and is getting worse. Yesterday I was stopped at the sign and saw an SUV towing a trailer approaching. As I began to pull across the street I realized the SUV was not going to stop. I came inches from a serious accident.

This was not an isolated incident, but the norm for many Indian Lake residents. The sad thing is that people who have never stopped at this sign have now, by example, taught their driving age children that it is okay not to stop. We all see them and know who they are. I don't understand why they openly practice this behavior to save 10 seconds at the risk of injuring or even killing a neighbor and friend. There are young children and a blind man who live at that corner.

Some of the residents near the sign have called Lawrence police and they have come out and issued many citations. We will continue to do so until our neighbors respect our safety, so be prepared to stop at the sign or pay the fine.....if you don't injure or kill someone first.



Emerald Ash Borer

If you've been following the emerald ash borer story at the annual meeting, in community emails and in the previous edition of the Smoke Signal, you know that our eighborhood ash trees are in trouble. The board formed an EAB task force in February, and I'd like to report the results.

The Indian Lake website now contains links to finding an EAB tree service, the Purdue EAB website, the EAB presentation by John Schaust, and how damage to trees can cut income tax. There's also a link to finding a traditional tree service, should a dead tree need to be removed.

In spring, the board voted to treat important ash trees at our beaches and park with imidacloprid. You might have noticed trees with a dark green circle painted on their trunk, about a foot from the ground. These are the ash trees identified as being important. Important trees were selected based on health, size, location, and the future cost of removing a dead tree.

About twenty trees in all were identified and treated. Treatment will need to be repeated each spring, for the life of the tree.

Thanks to Andy Van Treese for spending a Saturday identifying ash trees, and a Sunday treating them!

If you have any questions about identifying an ash tree on your property or treatment options, contact a board member.

Keep leaves out of the lake

Fall brings beautiful colors to our abundant trees, but it also means abundant falling leaves.

Rake leaves as soon as possible after they fall to prevent them from blowing into the lake. Don't blow leaves or rake yard debris into the lake. Leaves add phosphorus to the water and use up valuable oxygen as they decompose. Phosphorus increases algae growth and reduces water quality. Depleted oxygen harms our fish population.

In an undisturbed setting, some leaves do end up in lakes, but most of the leaves are caught in shoreline vegetation.

Dredging Season Saved


This July, we had some unplanned excitement when our dredge operator, Terry Slocum, reported that the dredge pump had lost pressure, and the dredge was wanting to spin in the water. Jeff Van Treese and Ed French pulled the dredge out of the water for an inspection.

The problem was easy to spot with the dredge trailered – the twenty foot boom underneath the dredge had split open on a seam. The boom is a 12 inch square tube used to lower the cutter head and carry pressurized discharge from the pump to the back of the dredge.

The manufacturer quoted \$6000 and 8 weeks lead time for a replacement part. This didn't even include the substantial time and expense of labor. This option would mean an end to our 2011 dredging season.

After consulting with Bill Testin, Ed French and our mechanic, Emery Harris, Jeff believed that the boom could be repaired on the trailer by welding angle iron along the split seam. This would require removing the pump housing and modifying the trailer frame to allow lowering the boom pipe below the pontoons.

Jeff's plan worked. Less than a week later, on a Friday, the dredge was back in the water. Making up for lost time, Terry eagerly worked the weekend, proving out the repair. Thanks Terry, and thanks Jeff!




Don't let this happen to you

2011 has been a bad year for boats getting loose at Indian Lake. About a dozen got loose in early spring floods. One pontoon boat went over the spillway and was completely destroyed. The boat in the photo was saved in the nick of time.

Take the following steps to make sure this doesn't happen to you:

- Winter storage: anchor boats stored at the beaches at two points, using cement blocks, posts or trees. Take measures to prevent tampering.
- Boating season: When the lake rises due to flooding, docked boats want to rise too. Short anchor ropes from boats to the dock can snap, cleats on boats and docks pull off, or the dock can be pulled apart. To prevent these problems, tie your boat to the dock using a rope with some stretch, such as nylon. Tie your boat to the dock using an X pattern. This will amplify the amount of stretch because the rope is longer.
- All year round: make sure your watercraft is marked with your lot number. A properly identified boat stands the best chance of being recovered quickly and safely.

- Healthy homes assessment for seniors that identifies unintentional injury hazards and provides practical assistance when possible. The aim of the senior healthy homes assessment is to enable seniors to live in their homes independently as long as possible. Possible assistance may include, tub railings, nightlights, level door handles, shower chairs, raised toilet seats etc.
- Healthy homes assessments for parents with young children aimed at identifying hidden dangers for children. Possible assistance may include baby gates, outlet covers, cabinet locks etc.
- The LSHH department also offers consumer products testing for heavy metals. Most items tested are children's toys, dinnerware or eating utensils; however, LSHH has tested food and ethnic products as well.
- Further services include home testing for elevated radon levels and lead based paint, blood lead testing for children and pregnant women, asthma and developmental assessment for children with elevated blood lead tests and, and as funds permit, grant assistance for home repairs.

The important work of our dredge assistants

As some of you may know, our dredging operation and our neighborhood as a whole, require many hours of "hands on" work to make everything operate in a smooth fashion. Our dredge operator, Terry Slocum is essential to our dredging operation. You may not realize the important work of our dredge assistants. Some of the things that have to happen on a regular basis are as follows:

- Greasing all dredging equipment
- Maintenance of the workboat
- Gathering logs out of the lake that are floating or "stuck" in the bottom from a flood
- Shoreline retention with rip rap
- Maintaining of the floats on our dredge discharge pipe
- And the biggest job of all, putting the dredge pipe into and taking it out of the water.

This year there have been two young neighbors added to the crew of workers that stand out as absolute workhorses. Zack Sweeney and Jordan Van Treese have been called to "man the dredge pipe" and help with the grueling task of dragging the pipe into the water, tying the floats on, connecting the pipes together (while standing in 5' of water), dragging to the existing pipe (again in 5' of water), sometimes having to go under water to locate the other pipe, and finally connect them. Both of these young men have really stepped up to the plate and helped the dredging operation operate efficiently this year. Our summer work crew consists of Zack York and Zack Sweeney, with Jordan as a backup for bigger projects where some height is needed. From the ILIA board, Thanks guys, your hard work does not go unnoticed!
