Watchful Neighbors Keep Our Neighborhood Safe

On August 2nd, some of our residents on South Drive and Winona had mail stolen from their mailboxes. Empty envelopes were found on the ground, down the street from affected mailboxes.

The thief only removed items that looked potentially valuable such as gift cards, credit cards, birthday envelopes and packages. One resident found an opened package with a shirt, apparently not in the thief's size. Another had a paycheck stolen. We didn't know if the culprit was on foot, bike or in a car.

An email alert was immediately sent to Indian Lake residents, notifying them to be on the lookout for suspicious activity. (If you're not on the email list and want to be, let me know.)

The very next day, an observant resident spotted a young male on bike, going through a cluster of mailboxes on South Drive. She watched him ride to the next mailbox down the street and open it too. She got in her car and followed the suspect at a distance, picking up another Indian Lake resident along the way. They continued to follow the suspect down Winona and called 911. By the time the police arrived at the scene, the suspect had fled on foot, following a confrontation. The police combed Watson Farms, eventually apprehending the culprit, who was identified by our residents.

We later found out that the thief lives in a trailer park on Pendleton Pike. A friend would drop him and his bike off in residential areas. Because he was just short of eighteen years old, the prosecutor was reluctant to pursue the case, but many Indian Lake residents followed up with Lawrence PD and the US Postal Service. Ultimately, the US Postal Inspector JJ De St. Jean intervened, and charges were planned to be filed at the state level.

Sincere thanks goes out to our watchful and willing-toget-involved Indian Lake neighbors. Only through their efforts was the thief caught!


Sports Gear

Since Steve returned to Indian Lake in 2003, there have been strange occurrences at 9903 Indian Lake Blvd. N. 

First and foremost, the lake rules posted at the beaches and in the directories still apply. Please review them if you have not already.


When using the lake for winter activities please remember to respect individuals properties as well as ILIA property. Please stay off the concrete spillway and the earthen dam. The spillway becomes extremely slippery as the ice forms and can be very dangerous.

Second, please be aware of yellow caution tape around some areas that are of special concern. The board will mark areas that they wish to keep people from treading on or possibly hurting themselves. Keep in mind that just because there is no tape in an area, doesn't mean it's safe or allowed.

Third, please be respectful of the hour. Being that there is no leafy foliage around the lake to dampen the noise, please use consideration as to how much of a ruckus you create at what time of the day.

Last year, residents enjoyed snowmobiling, cross country skiing, and just strolling across the lake with child in tote behind on a bobsled, so there is something for everyone.

Blast from the Past

This 1940 census map shows the Indian Lake area twelve years after the creation of Indian Lake. The Indian Lake Country Club, Salvation Army Camp, Sunnyside Sanitarium (now Westminster Village North) and Fort Benjamin Harrison are all shown. Geist Reservoir didn't yet exist; it was created in 1943.

Each square dot on the map represents a home - there were only six in the Indian Lake neighborhood back then. Sarah Rohrman and Jim Hoskins were kind enough to provide some additional information about them.


"A" is now the Gillum's house. When I first moved here in 1963, it belonged to the Norman family (Sarah).

"B" is now Houck's. As far back as I go, I think Paul Butalla owned the home (Sarah). According to the census, Dr. Ted Rhodes and his wife Martha lived there in 1940.


"C" is now the Hoskins' property. The house was built in 1932 by Dr. and Mrs. Evans as an artist's retreat. The Hoskins family moved there in 1941.

"D" is, of course, French's. Before the Frenches, it had the reputation as being a farmhouse that ran a bootleg liquor business (Sarah).

"E" is now Slocum's. According to the census, Tom Reeves lived there in 1940. Ben Slocum says the house was built in 1933.



"F" is our house (Sarah). It started out as a one-room weekend cottage, built shortly after the lake was created. I don't know who was here first, and don't know if the same owners turned it into a small lake house.



The 1940 census also included featherweight boxer Merle Alte, who lived in what's now the Crouch's home, so it's uncertain whether "F" is Rohrman or Crouch.

Alte was active in boxing from 1922 until 1933. His opponents included California Joe Lynch, Doc Snell and Phil O'Dowd. Alte later became the Executive Secretary of the State of Indiana Athletics Commission.

Developer Agrees To Pay Impact Fee

It's been several years since a new development has been proposed in our watershed.

In early November, we received notice that an 18.7 acre strip mall was being planned for the northwest corner of 46th Street and German Church Road. A rezoning hearing was scheduled for December 3, to rezone the property from agricultural to commercial use.

Not only is this property in our watershed, Indian Creek adjoins and drains the property to the west. As a result, virtually all the sediment that would leave this site during the development process would end up deposited in Indian Lake.

We contacted the developer's agent, requesting a \$120 per disturbed acre impact fee. This would reimburse Indian Lake's projected costs of dredging sediment that would result from this development, assuming that the developer complied with Rule 5 erosion control practices.

The developer agreed and provided a written commitment. On December 3, the Lawrence Board of Zoning Appeals approved the rezoning.

South Beach Gate Locked for Winter

The South Beach gate will be locked for the winter. The lock will be a combination lock, so the keys for the summer lock won't open it.
