It was also my pleasure to honor with a plaque Jerry Mitchell who served as your President for three years. Unfortunately, there is no way to thank Jerry adequately for all the hours and effort she spent on our behalf. Well, anyway, thanks again, Jerry.

The Association approved the 1979 budget and voted Paul Butalla, Glen Rork and Tom Crouch to three-year terms.

I would also like to thank Joe Zainey and the Lawrence Journal for taking many pictures of our annual meeting and then running a picture in his newspaper.

The January Board was primarily one of organization. Elected as board officers were:

The goals for the coming year were articulated:

- 1. Do everything possible to keep lake full 10 straight years.
- 2. Complete following projects.
 - a. Silt trap
 - b. Reforestation of East End
 - c. Completion of fish attractors
 - d. Dam repairs
 - e. Killing of carp and other undesirable fish
 - f. Restocking of lake with fish
- 3. Improve curfew problems on North Beach.
- 4. Improve communication with teenagers.
- 5. Continue Lake Beautification.

Additional business discussed at the January meeting was:

We authorized a contract to Joe Norman Construction for \$15,000 to construct the silt trap, build three islands in the east end and to do the repairs to the dam levee.

A contract was also let for \$1,400 to handle the planting of the nearly 5,000 trees on the east end. It appears we will be entitled to a 90% refund of this by the federal government.

The Board also approved the obtaining of bids to construct a sea wall and boat tie up on the North Beach.

The February Board Meeting was mainly a coordination meeting making sure our projects were on schedule.

As most of you know the sewer work is currently about 40% complete in our lake. So far everything is about as expected. The excess dirt is being removed. The dirt ramp over the dam will be removed on completion of the project. It now appears that the sewer will be complete well within schedule.

The trench, levee for the new silt trap is now under construction. Part of the modification to the area below the dam is complete. The three islands have been constructed.

The only hold up to our filling the lake in May is the completion of the Association's various projects. To help insure this completion, we need your help. We have five scheduled work days this spring. They are:

Any resident caught by the Security Officer will either be escorted home or their parents will be contacted by Gary Benjamin or Glen Brown. This applies to the first offense. The second time around the person will be taken into custody. All non-residents will be cited for trepassing and taken into custody. So many fine people around this lake, and so much to be thankful for. I wonder how often we really take time to count our blessings.

Bob and I had a grand time at the annual meeting a few weeks ago. We were so delighted to see the number of fine people willing to shoulder thenecessary responsibilities for a community such as this. It was especially heart warming to meet many new neighbors and very special to renew old friendships. A few inquiries at the meeting are responsible for the gist or theme of this month's column.

It's just about sixteen years ago that several of the ladies in our community thought it might be a good idea if we had some sort of news sheet to keep neighbors in touch with each other and report the comings and goings around the lake. The first paper was compiled over the table at Lois Armstrongs with the aid of pots and pots of coffee and much laughter. The following papers were compiled each month amid much fellowship in spite of the handicap of an ancient typewriter and an even more ancient ditto machine which on occasion would absolutely refuse to turn out legible copies.

What is it they say, Old Age is creeping on when one starts to think so much of the past. I think not, especially when they have been good years amid friendly people. I can sit here at my window and look across at many of the homes on the lake.

Right across the lake was Forest and Mabel Monical's home. Mabel was the adopted grandmother to many of the children, and they all enjoyed homemade cookies. Wouldn't Forest and Mabel be so happy to think the home was still a very happy center for a lovely family David and Zelda Upton and their two sons, Benjamin and Jacob.

Just a few houses along from that is the home of Bob and Mary Nicholas. Would you believe that such a proper and august person as Robert I. Nicholas, who has been president of the board of this lake several times, was once run off the lake by Tom and Bud Reeves for fishing illegally. This was about 42 years ago. The lake was having financial problems at that time and was in receivership and the Marion County Sheriff was responsible for passes to the lake. Robert promptly made friends with Auto Ray, the Sheriff, and got a pass to fish. According to Bob, Auto Ray was the only democratic sheriff he ever voted for.

Just a stones throw from the Nicholas backyard is the first permanent home on the lake. Tom and Bud Reeves' Dad built the stucco house almost a half century ago. The entire Reeves family have been very much a part of Indian Lake for a long time.

Did you know that where Mildred French's lovely home stands there used to be an old farmhouse and barn? Ed and Mildred bought the property in 1946 and moved to the lake a year later. Ed used to tell stories about some of the callers they would get at their home. Apparently the farm house and barn had been used for deeds that were not within the law (then or still to this day) and it would often be raided by the Sheriff's Dept. The French's has been a happy home over the years and more than generous where the community was concerned.

Ray and Sally Heinzen next door feel they are practically new comers, just a mere 22 years on the lake. As far as Bob and I are concerned Ray does not look one day older than the first day we met him, almost seventeen years ago. We watched as their children, Ronnie and Kathy, grew up. Also remember Grandma who lived with them for a time. Its been a pleasure knowing Sally and Ray over the years.

Have you ever read the abstract that you receive when you purchase your home? If you have, then you know that Paul and Dottie Klepfer not only have lived on the lake for years but that a large part of this area was Klepfer family farms. Even further back, some of the original settlers of this area were Klepfers.

Another long time resident is Fred Lee who qualifies in the honor roll of founding members of the community. Many times on my way home from the beach with my family, I would walk past the Kingsbury and Mitchell residences and often stop to talk for a time. Then right next door, Doc Brodie would be enjoying the summer weather. I don't know how many years, but it certainly has been a long time since Doctor and Helen Brodie came to the lake. Helen has gone to Florida for a well deserved vacation, and we hope she has a wonderful time and perfect weather.

A real sweet lady by the name of Louise Hoskins said she and Doc used to come camping out on their land where they eventually built their home. Louise and Doc came to live on the lake in 1941. It was a perfect place to raise their family, and now Louise has the joy of seeing her grandchildren enjoying the lake too. I remember Doc sitting on the pier at the end of his property. He was not only a vet, he was indeed quite an authority on all wildlife, fish, plants, flowers and bird identification.

Another man who was great at the fishing and helped many of the local kids was Frog Gardiner. I remember him explaining very patiently to a real green horn how it was possible to ice-fish. If we have some young folks on the lake today who need coaching in the art of fishing, we are very fortunate to have an expert on the subject.
