SWIMMING NOTES... You can hop right in, swimmers, the water's fine, according to Joe Ketterman, Marion County Health Department, who tested Indian Lake this past week. He reports that the coliform count at the North Beach is 30. A count of 200 is considered safe for swimming. He also tested below the dam, and all the way down Indian Creek to 46th Street; and, while slightly higher in places due to farmland all well within safe limits. Enjoy!

REMINDER TO OUR FISHERMEN

Fishing this year has been good, and so that it continues to be, please follow the fishing limits established by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. These legal limits are in effect to prevent depletion of fish. There will be good fishing for all Indian Lake residents if you'll obey the legal limits. They are: 1. No more than five (5) large mouth bass. 2. No more than twenty-five (25) Crappies.

And, following last year's rules, please remove all Bullhead Catfish and Carp that you catch. Return all Channel Catfish and all Bluegills you don't want to eat. Be sure to cut the line if any are hooked severely, so they may live.

BE AWARE OF DANGER if you swim at night (which you should never do unattended), A large gill net is being used at times during evenings to rid the lake of carp and shad. It is 100 feet in length and 6 feet in depth. It floats downward from plastic milk jugs which can be seen if you're watching for them. Stay clear, because becoming entangled could cause drowning. The net is put out in the middle of the lake according to Ted Adolay.
