PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Neighbors:

In the future, I hope all Smoke Signals will contain this column: "Suggestions For Our Lake". This will be YOUR column. This will be your opportunity to make suggestions for the betterment of our lake.

I have yet to talk with an Association member that did not have some sort of suggestion for improving our lake in one way or another. Usually, your suggestions are unique and thought provoking. They deserve to be shared among all of our residents.

This column will be your opportunity to participate in the Smoke Signal. Just put your thoughts on paper and send them to Jane Quirk. Jane is an excellent editor and she will help you get your comments into proper format.

To kick this column off, I'll start with a couple of suggestions I've been thinking about for the past five years.

For years, our Association has been exploring means for removing sediment from our lake. All sediment projects have extremely high price tags attached.

Perhaps another means of deepening our lake could be by raising the water level a foot or two. To do this, the following would have to be considered:

- a. Approval would have to obtained from appropriate regulatory agencies. I don't know if approval could be obtained.
- b. Every resident who owns lake front property would have to agree to the rise in water levels. One person objecting would stop the project, and this is fair and just.
- c. An expensive cap would have to be constructed on the existing spillway. I don't know whether this is fasible.
- d. We would not want to increase our flooding problems by one or two feet, so an additional spillway would have to be constructed at or slightly above the new water level to handle the flood waters. The new spillway could be engineered to eliminate flooding nearly completely. I have no idea of what the size, specifications or costs of a new spillway would be, but I would guess thatit would need to be at least as large as the existing spillway.

The extra spillway could be constructed alone (without capping the existing spillway to our earthen dam at a slightly higher elevation than our existing spillway.

I'm not advocating that we do these things or even consider them. They are just off-the-wall ideas good for nothing more than food-for-thought. So, if you have any wild thoughts you've been harboring for years (concerning our lake, of course), (over, please)

or serious suggestions, send them to Jane. She'll put them in the next Smoke


