PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fellow Residents of Indian Lake,

It has been quite awhile since I have gotten information out to you concerning Indian Lake business. All the people involved with the Smoke Signal are going to strive to get an issue out every two months.

The Board members want to thank the residents that helped out at the annual beach cleanup in May. We had over 50 people participating. The North Beach as well as the South Beach had an enormous amount of debris accumulated. It was far worse than in past years. They now look wonderful. We ask that all the residents that utilize the beaches, keep them clean.

Back in April an opinion survey was sent out to all lake residents concerning whether to open the gate at the dam for flood control. The majority of the responses we received were not in favor of opening the gate. The Board then voted 5 to 4 not to open the gate.

Community appearance is another project that the board has been very concerned with. We have a few eye sores around, but it appears that these problems with debris are being cleaned up. If any resident has a problem with unsightly debris, call one of the board members. We will act as swiftly as possible to eliminate the problem and keep Indian Lake a neighborhood to be proud of.

A couple of the Board members are looking into the problem of removing the silt build up at the East End of our lake. The are currently investigating different avenues of securing funds to pay for this project. I will keep you informed of their progress. While we're on the subject of the East End of the lake, the trapper that we hired

this year had good success trapping beaver. These beaver were causing a good bit of damage to trees along the lake. If any residents notice continued problems with the beaver, call us immediately.

In the past, we have arranged for a heavy trash pick up each Spring. I contacted Laidlaw Waste Disposal Systems, which is our weekly trash pick up company, and they informed me of the following guidelines on trash pick up. Limit your trash bags to 20 or less per week. They will pick up heavy items such as refrigerators or any large item that can be compacted in their truck. With that kind of service, I currently feel it is not necessary for a special heavy trash pick up.

I again want to invite any lake resident to attend our monthly Board meetings. The Board meetings are held the second Monday of each month. Call any one of the Board members for the location of the meeting. Have a wonderful summer and I will keep you informed on a regular basis.
