BOARD OF DIRECTORS' REPORT

At the October meeting of the Indian Lake Improvement Association the Directors elected Russ Koehring to fill the president's post vacated by Charles Spellman. Don Kyser was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Board.

The November meeting of the ILIA was held on Sunday, Nov. 17, 1968.

The Board determined, after hearing the financial report, that an additional amount of 91-day savings certificates should be purchased since there would be no large cash demands until after the first of the new year.

Planning for the annual meeting in January 1969 continued with the selection of names for a Budget and Audit Cormittee. The Board also directed the President to establish and select a Proxy Committee for the purpose of insuring that there will be sufficient members represented at the annual meeting to officially transact the business of the Association and to elect the new Board Members.

Paul Klepfer reported that he had a good turn-out of residents to help him beach and winterize the dredge. He is also searching for a new dredge operator now so that operations can begin early next spring.

The Board requested that Mr. Klepfer obtain estimates for clearing the approach to the south-side beach and for a limited amount of earth removal at the extreme east end of the lake using land-based earth moving equipment.
