COVID-19 and the Indian Lake Community

The COVID-19 pandemic has been on everyone's mind and has been a major topic of board discussion since early this year. The board is united in taking the pandemic seriously and is following all recommendations issued by the Governor. It strives to find the right balance between protecting public health and protecting personal freedoms. Accordingly, Indian Lake Beach and Park Restrictions were issued by the board on April 18. These were sent by email to all residents who are on the Indian Lake email list. The board has since issued a follow-up statement.

It's more important than ever to have as many residents as possible on the Indian Lake email list. If you don't receive regular emails from me, you're not on the list. All emails are sent Bcc so your credentials are hidden from everyone else. A few residents prefer not to be included, and that preference is respected.

Since April, the board has been meeting virtually. Meetings are still the second Wednesday of each month at 7 PM. If you want to join a meeting, contact me beforehand for a virtual invitation. We're currently using Skype, but our virtual meeting platform is subject to change.

Despite COVID-19, the board is planning for a full dredging season this summer and the dredge is being prepared as I write. For other things, it's still too early to know how the pandemic will play out and what the response of the board will be.



USES BLANK CARTRIDGES IN HOLDUP; GETS \$1,000

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 11—A well dressed bandit who used blank cartridges for ammunition late yesterday held up and robbed members of a bridal party at the Indian Lake summer cottage of Mrs. Max Bardach, north of Indianapolis. Jewelry valued at \$1,000 and \$43 in cash were taken. The robber escaped with an accomplice in an automobile.

The man walked into the cottage while 12 women were engaged in a bridge game. He drew a revolver and commanded the women to remave their jewelry and took money from their purses.

While the robbery was in progress the bandit fired a shot at the floor. Later Deputy Sheriffs Cook and Hanley were unable to find the mark of a shot in the floor and concluded the bandit's pistol was loaded with blank cartridges.

Blast from the past

This front page article is from the Saturday August 11, 1934 edition of the Greencastle Daily Banner newspaper. It describes an armed robbery at the Indian Lake summer cottage of Mrs. Max Bardach.

A follow-up article a month later says the armed bandit was Arthur McGinnis, an associate of gangster John Dillinger. Dillinger had been killed at the Biograph Theater in Chicago on July 22. McGinnis was captured by Chicago police in a gun battle to round up Dillinger associates. Indianapolis police were seeking to have him extradited to stand trial for multiple bridge party holdups and a drug store robbery in Indianapolis.

Banish moles from your yard

If you're tired of seeing your front lawn crisscrossed with mole hills, follow this proven mole repellent formula from the Purdue Extension Service.

An Indian Lake neighbor reports that he's had amazing success using Scott's lawn grub control to ward off moles. By killing the grubs, you eliminate a favorite food source for moles. Scott's says that their grub control doesn't harm earthworms which moles also like to eat, so grub control only eliminates a portion of the mole's food supply. The ultimate treatment might be to use castor oil and grub control.



CASTOR OIL VS. THE MOLES

The following formula has been used successfully by hundreds of homeowners in the Midwest. This potion will not kill the mole, but they do not like to tunnel in soil treated with this formula.

In a blender, whip 3 oz. castor oil and 3 tablespoons liquid detergent. Blend till frothy. Add 8 tablespoons water and blend again till frothy. Using a 15 gallon Ortho hose end sprayer, put 15 tablespoons of mix in the jar. Fill remainder of jar with water. Attach sprayer to garden hose and spray the entire lawn and garden area. Apply walking at a slow pace. After spraying, set up a lawn sprinkler and water about 20 minutes to an area. Repeat if moles return.

Two applications per year are average. Spring is the best time to apply as the ground is usually soft. Then, you better warn your neighbors that they will be the benefactors of the moles.
