Sale of Indian Lake Homesites Sets Record With Week-End Crowds

Meet the Neighbor

Meet RJ Russell. RJ moved to the North Side of Indian Lake ten years ago with his wife, Stacy, and son Jackson, now 11. Their second son, Jason, now 9, came along later. Russell learned of the community about a decade prior when his parents had been looking for homes. "I grew up a 'lake rat' on Lake Shafer," explains Russell. So when he and Stacy were ready to move, he knew he wanted to look in the Indian Lake area. Their agent took them to the house on 7252 Cherokee Drive. "It needed a lot of work," recalls RJ. "There was no air conditioning, no furnace, there was water in the basement, and everything in the house dated back to the 70's when Ed Thomas' family lived there." After walking through the house and cataloging all the work that it needed, they followed their real estate agent to the beach. "That was it," declares Russell. "I said, 'I don't care what it takes."

It ended up taking 4 months of late nights and long weekends. "I was teaching and coaching, and it was the height of the wrestling season." At first, there was no electricity or running water, but RJ was extremely motivated to move his family into their new home at Indian Lake.

Now RJ and Stacy's boys are living the "lake rat" life. "My boys have it so good," Russell chuckles. They are always at the park or down at the lake or riding with Stacy and me in the golf cart around the neighborhood." He shakes his head with a grin, "It doesn't get much better than that."

Most ILIA residents will recall that Russell held a position on the ILIA board from 2009 - 2014. He wanted to be a





part of the decisions and improvements being made in the community. During his service on the board he was instrumental in the acquisition and installation of the new tennis court and playground equipment

at the park, designed and constructed the dumpster enclosure, and helped build the stone parking lot border at the North Beach. Although RJ remains active in the neighborhood, he had to give up his seat on the board in 2014 as work demands increased. By then he was selling real estate part-time in addition to his teaching.

By July 2015, Russell's success in real estate, and the recent political changes in education, spurred him to make a career change, going into real estate full-time. Although he admits that the change from high school math teacher to full-time agent was an adjustment, he asserts, "The great thing is, I still get to teach." He explains, "I find that many people don't know the legalities involved in buying or selling a home, or understand market value. I get excited about opportunities to educate, and people are eager to learn from someone they trust."

Russell has helped some Indian Lake home-owners sell and buy their residences, so it's quite possible you've seen his name on signs around the neighborhood. However, RJ is also easy to spot in person chatting with neighbors on the North Beach, trolling on the lake with his family, or driving his boys around in the golf cart. So, if you fancy yourself a life-long learner, you may want to flag down Mr. Russell. You could be treated to a lesson on anything from property values to polynomials.



Marion County Tox Drop Program

Ever wonder how to properly dispose of hazardous household wastes such as fluorescent light bulbs, chemicals and electronics? The Marion County ToxDrop is the answer.

Citizens of Marion County can use this program to properly dispose of their unwanted and unused household hazardous waste (HHW). Over the last decade, the ToxDrop program has annually diverted in excess of 1.0 million pounds of HHW from the city's sewers, waterways, and landfills. ToxDrop is an Indianapolis/Marion County program managed by the Department of Public Works.

The ToxDrop site closest to Lawrence is 9049 East 10th Street. It's open the third Saturday of each month from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Examples of materials that are accepted at ToxDrop locations include batteries, fluorescent light bulbs, glue and adhesives, paints, paint thinner, pesticides, household thermometers, used motor oil, and gasoline. See the chart for more details. Residents are limited to disposing of twenty-gallons of liquid waste or seventy-five pounds of solid waste, per visit.

Electronics may also be disposed of at the ToxDrop, but are subject to limitations. Visit the Indy ecycling website to find out more:


