President's Message

As I write this, the final preparations have been made for establishing the new lawn at North Beach. The island will be reseeded too. This brings to a close an incredibly busy season of infrastructure improvements at Indian Lake.

Spoils Area Privacy Fence

In May, 100 feet of 72" cedar privacy fence was installed at the east end of the lake. This area is used for storing dredging-related equipment and winter storage of boats. The board has just approved the purchase of stain, and the fence will be stained by volunteer labor this fall or in

the spring. Thanks to Andy Van Treese for successfully managing this project.

North Beach Dock

Anyone who's visited North Beach lately has been struck by how much more useable waterfront space we now have.



The North Beach project was a large undertaking. It suffered from multiple delays, some weather-related, some material-related, but most were contractor-related. The board didn't like the bumper system that the contractor was using and switched to the current bumpers, introducing an additional delay.

Volunteer labor played a big role in this project. Ed French spread gravel with his Bobcat. Shawn Alexander did the same. Eddie Mathews, James Mills, and Chad Rosebrock responded to our call for help and moved gravel with shovels and wheelbarrows. Kerry Brown refurbished the wooden dock.

Many truckloads of compactable fill dirt were needed for this project. The original plan was to use material from the spoils area, but Dan Van Treese arranged for free dirt from a nearby basement excavation to be delivered at no charge, giving us more suitable dirt and saving the \$2k expense of excavation and trucking.

Topsoil was a similar story. During the wet month of July, topsoil was unavailable from any local supplier. Dan Van Treese



noticed a soil screening operation in the Fort, and notified the board. Marge Crouch made an inquiry, and we were able to arrange for free dirt and delivery. Ed Thomas will be providing his lawn care expertise at no charge as we prepare to amend the soil with compost, then seed, straw, fertilize and water the area.

South Beach Dock

The South Beach dock installation also had unexpected complications involving its bumper system. Originally, the contractor installed treated lumber along the top edge of the dock as a bumper. This was a tripping hazard, looked bad, and would have caused thermal expansion problems. A ten foot plastic dock section expands an inch from summer to winter and lumber doesn't, so the materials are incompatible. We designed an alternative solution using other EZ Dock components along with HDPE plastic lumber that solved our concerns.

North Beach Swim Platform

The floating swim platform at North Beach was replaced, using the same floating EZ Dock components as the South Beach dock. At installation, two large concrete barrel weights were used to keep the platform in place, but we quickly learned that the large weights posed an unanticipated diving hazard. The barrel weights were replaced with poles for safety reasons. The new swim platform is a very nice upgrade for our swimmers.

What Makes a Good Neighbor?

Neighbor (na – ber): 1. a person who lives near another. 2. a person who shows kindliness or helpfulness toward his or her fellow humans.

We live in a unique neighborhood and each of us probably had our own reasons for wanting to live at Indian Lake. For some of us it was, of course, the lake. For others, it may be the wooded lots, the hilly terrain, wildlife, or your particular home. We often don't think about our neighbors when we buy a home. "Good" neighbors can be a joy, however, "bad" neighbors can create frustration. It may be hard to agree on a specific definition of what makes a good neighbor, however, we can all make an attempt to do a few things that seem to be important to many (as identified from a previous ILIA survey and taken from resident comments and suggestions). In addition, these recommendations will assist us in maximizing home values and attracting new residents who appreciate our wonderful community.

Curb Appeal: Please do your part to ensure your home remains in good repair and your yard is maintained. Our association covenants specify that grass (or weeds) on your property must be kept cut. While we don't have restrictive covenants in place for every situation, several homeowners have been concerned about neighbors storing the large trash and recycling containers now required by the city in front of their homes, clearly visible from the street. These containers, along with plastic toys, water toys/tubes, building materials, and boat trailers left in front yards and/or on front porches detract from the neighborhood and can be an eyesore for those around you. Please be considerate and move these items to the backyard or garage. If you don't have a backyard (many homes here don't), think about a simple privacy fence for a side yard.

Trash: Being in a wooded area means that we have lots of wildlife. If you put your trash out to the curb overnight

(or store it permanently outside), chances are that raccoons will investigate. Trash collectors do not pick up scattered trash on the ground or in your neighbor's yard. If your trash has been tipped over/opened/scattered, it is your responsibility to pick it up (by the way, this IS part of the Indian Lake Association covenants). In addition, the City of Lawrence specifies that trash containers should not be placed at the curb until after 6pm the evening before trash pickup, and all trash within the container must be bagged.

Mailboxes: Keep your mailbox and its post rust-free and in good repair, with a door that will close. Don't forget to trim/mow around the mailbox area, even if it is on a common area. Volunteer to help homeowners around you who may not be able to maintain their own area.

Speed Limits: Speeding in our neighborhood is a concern to many residents. Please be a good neighbor by observing the speed limits on our streets every time. Not only does this show courtesy to other neighbors but it also helps to discourage "cut-through" traffic from speeding on our streets when they are behind you. Bikers, walkers, children, pets and wildlife will appreciate your observance of the speed limit.

Other: On a positive note, many homeowners have continued to upgrade their curb appeal. Look around and chances are you'll see homes with new plantings, paint, walkways/porches and many other improvements. The civic committee and other residents do a fantastic job keeping our entrances, park, and other common areas looking their best. Thank you to all the good neighbors who give their time and effort to beautify our community.





Meet the Neighbor

Bob Karnak, like many of us, has been riding a bicycle for as long as he can remember. Unlike most of us, Bob continues to ride his bike even as a 70 year old retiree. Bob rides for health, the enjoyment of meeting new people, and the pleasure of seeing new places at a much slower pace. The world looks considerably different on a bicycle riding along at 10 or 15 miles per hour than it does from a car window zipping by at 60 or 70 miles per hour.

About 16 years ago, Bob found another reason for riding: raising money for charity. Everyone is familiar with all of the runs, walks and other "athletic" events raising money for an almost endless number of charities. There are also a large number of bicycle rides, often in somewhat unusual places, that provide funds for a myriad of charities.

In 2002 a friend challenged Bob to take his bike to Death Valley, California, ride 100 miles through the valley in one day, and raise some money for what was then The Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, now JDRF. Bob accepted the challenge, rode 100 miles in Death Valley, and began a journey that continues to this day. Bob rode for JDRF in Death Valley for 10 consecutive years.

During that time Bob's wife, your neighbor, Annette, was diagnosed with a rare, non-aggressive type of leukemia and subsequently non-Hodgkins lymphoma. After 10 years of raising money for JDRF, Bob began riding and raising money for The Leukemia and

Lymphoma Society, a cause much closer to home.

On June 4, 2017 Bob completed his 6th consecutive, 100 mile ride around Lake Tahoe. Over the course of 6 years, Bob has raised more than \$80,000 for The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society to support the search for better treatments and perhaps someday, a cure for blood cancers. Bob plans to continue riding as long as he can and raising money for The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

If you see a bike rider on the road, please give him a little extra room. Like Bob, that rider may be riding to raise money for a charity and make the world a little better place.


The weather was beautiful and a great time was had by all.


